

NEWS FROM THE TRUST


We have had a problem at the Community Centre, the gas supply system into and through the building has been closed by the Gas Board as it was deemed unsafe after we reported a potential gas leak. There is only one gas meter serving the entire building, it is in the Middle Sheet Hall kitchen and was installed in 1985. The Inspector deemed that it is too small to cope with the demand for the whole building. Not only that, the pipework from that meter to the Main Street side of the building is also too small! Luckily this has come to light whilst the temperature is relatively mild. The Church Synod, who we lease from, have been guick to respond to this and we are hoping to get the Hall back to normal in the week or so, but not the rest of the building. The only viable solution is to have another gas meter at the front of the building, but this might take some time, but hopefully before winter sets in!

On a brighter note, in September we had the Community Centre open for part of the annual Berwick Heritage Open Doors (HODS) week. We were open for one full day and two half days, and we had about 120 people visiting during that time and many more during the week looking at the posters in the windows etc. Thanks to those of you who took part in the event by showing the posters on your gate or on your windows. The flow of people during those three days was just right as it gave us time to show them around the building and chat about our village.
