



We reported in our previous newsletter that the clock had significant problems which needed urgent attention. received a commitment from a funder. That's why the pendulum on the above starts at £5000. We have put one of these pendulum targets in the display case adjacent to the front door of the Community Centre. We hope soon to be moving the pendulum up to £6000, with the aid of some blu tack!




Heritage Open Days is England's largest community led festival of history and culture, involving thousands of local volunteers and organisations. Berwick-upon-Tweed is England's northernmost town, only three miles south of the border with Scotland. Berwick's position on the Border and its proximity to the North Sea made it a highly strategic place throughout history. From the medieval fortifications which can still be seen on the northern edge of the town, via the Elizabethan Ramparts visitors really can step through the ages.

Berwick HODS believe that history began yesterday so their exhibitions and talks reflect modern history too. The history on the south bank of the Tweed is just as vibrant, and in 2024 they are planning to delve deeper into the history of Tweedmouth and Spittal too. In 2023 they hosted 75 events during the two weeks of HODs, this year it will be over 90!




The annual Tweed Picnic Row from Spittal up the river to Paxton House and back will be taking place on Sunday 15<sup>th</sup> September. The boats are based on the St. Ayles Skiffs, and they are made by the groups rowing them, who come from both Scotland and England to take part in this row.

Previous years have seen a fleet of up to 20 skiffs attend this well-loved, sociable row. Quite a sight to be seen heading off under the famous bridges at Berwick and moored up in front of countless picnic blankets on the banks of the glorious Tweed 5 miles upstream. For those who may not have been before or may have lots of folk wanting to take part, there are opportunities for crew swaps at Paxton House and half way up/down the river so the event can easily cater for more than one crew per boat. Supporters or shore crew meet up with the rowers for the Picnic at Paxton.

The row takes about 2hrs, and we arrive at the beach at Paxton House for 2.00pm An hour at Paxton for a picnic, then back to Spittal. The return journey is massively quicker as both river and tide will be going out at that point,

There is also access to disabled toilets close by at the rear of the Pavilion building. We have a key for these facilities.



Connecting Threads is the cultural strand of the landscape-scale project Destination Tweed. We connect creative practitioners with conservationists, environmentalists, scientists, river specialists and communities of place and purpose, to celebrate the River Tweed through our five-year programme of cultural activity.



Artist Annie Lord is inviting people to contribute to a new artwork in celebration of the Old Berwick Bridge, its 400th anniversary this year, and the men and women who first worked on its construction. Since this April, Annie Lord has been artist in residence in Berwick-upon-Tweed, thanks to Connecting Threads.

Throughout her residency, Annie has developed handmade paint, made from the same sandstone used to repair the bridge. The sandstone creates a warm, reddish-brown colour, and provides an exciting, unpredictable material to work with.

Participants will each receive a limpet shell from Berwick beach, filled with handmade, locally sourced, sandstone paint as well as a stone-shaped piece of paper and paintbrush. They will be asked to create an artwork in honour of one of the named workers who contributed to the construction of the bridge, 400 years ago. These artworks will be displayed as part of Berwick Heritage Open Days over the weekend of the 14th and 15<sup>th</sup> September.
