You may have noticed the small change happening to a garage in Sea Road of late. The roller door disappeared, and a door and window put in its place. If you've looked through the window you will have noticed a splash of peacock blue on internal walls. This workshop come garage is getting new life put into it. Since January 2023 I've been through the planning process and onto conversion process to turn what would be 4 walls and a door into a sports massage therapy place.

The workshop/garage was first built by my grandad when they downsized the family business from working in the large workshop that once stood on what is now 4 houses on Sea Road. The workshop held the business of A. C. Burn and Sons Joiners & Glaziers which had been in the family for many generations. The small workshop had stood dormant for a few years and the opportunity arose after Covid to do something to it.

My names Kiri and for the last 7 years I've run my business from the dining room along the road from here in my parents' house. I'm a sports massage therapist that's been slowly building my little business up over the time.

Healing Handz was born as I came to the end of my maternity leave from having my youngest son. I had gone back to college two nights a week leaving my 8-week-old at home in the care of his dad. I retrained my massage skills 2 evenings a week at Newcastle college where my journey began a few years before, but at 21 I didn't know what I wanted to do. Two children later I had the perfect opportunity to retrain and fall in love with massage all over again. This time it was time to make it my own business.

This fascinating piece of pottery has been found on the beach. It shows the pelvis and legs of a skeleton. Do you have the top half or know what it was used for?





In the early summer of 1665, a parcel of cloth arrived at the tailor Alexander Hadfield's shop in the Derbyshire village of Eyam. Unfortunately, it contained fleas and their eggs carrying the plague. Within a week, his young assistant George Viccars was dead, shortly followed by Hadfield himself.

As a result, a decision was made by Rev. Mompesson to lock the village down to contain the plague. "A Place in Time " tells the stories of some of the families affected by this decision.
