WAYPOINT CHURCH: WHO ARE WE?

Waypoint Church started in 2017, in East Ord Village Hall, by Jonathan and Jenny Mackwell who had moved into the area, and a small group of locals who they had gathered through sharing the amazing love of Jesus. Waypoint Church isn't part of a traditional Christian denomination, it receives no finances or resources from a central body, but we are affiliated to a network of similar community churches throughout the world.

Like other Christian churches, we believe that the Bible is the Word of God, that it is as relevant today as when it was first written. We have seen the truth in action where Jesus proclaimed: "I came that they might have life and have it more abundantly." (John 10:10)

In the seven years since we started, we have grown from three to around fifty adults.

The teaching is Bible-based, relevant and thought-provoking. We have times for listening to God, and times for anyone to receive prayer.

You will be made welcome at 10.15 am on Sundays, to enjoy a cup of coffee, tea and snack. The service begins at 10.30am.
